

## General Information

Location: Events take place at the J.F. Friedrich Center on the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus. The Center is located at 1950 Willow Drive on the west end of the campus, behind the Natatorium. Only the Gemütliches Beisammensein is at the Keystone House at 901 University Bay Drive.

Transportation: Madison can be reached by air and Greyhound busses. There is also a bus from the Chicago airport directly to the campus for \$11 one way. The busses of the ALCO Bus Company leave Chicago O'Hare every 1½ hours from 9:30 am until 5:00 pm, also at 7:30 am and 7:00, 8:30 and 10:30 pm, at the Circle Restaurant between buildings 2 and 3. The ride takes three hours. Only taxi and limousine service is available from the Madison airport.

Registration: Advance registration is requested. The Registration Desk will be open in the Friedrich Center lobby Thursday, April 26,  
• 5 pm - 7 pm, Friday, April 27,  
8 am - 10 am, and Saturday, April 28,  
8 am - 10 am.

Fees: There is no registration fee for the meeting. Cost for the trip to Old World Wisconsin on April 27 is \$20.00 which includes transportation, admission and dinner. Cost for the luncheon on April 28 is \$4.50. Coffee will be available during breaks for a small charge.

Meals: Breakfast is available at the Friedrich Center. On Friday, the bus will make a stop at lunch time for a buffet meal. Information on Madison restaurants will be available at the Registration Desk.

Lodging: We recommend the J.F. Friedrich Center, a guest house on the University campus. Rates are \$26 single, \$30 double. Mastercard and Visa accepted, breakfast is available. Reservations through the Max Kade Institute.

Parking: \$2 per day on weekdays, free on weekends, at the Friedrich Center.
